The following activities were planned and conducted by the Institute:




3. Webinar organized on ‘India: The Mother of Democracy’

A webinar was organized by the Electoral Literacy Club in collaboration with the Department of Humanities and Social Sciences, MNIT Jaipur on the subject ‘India: The Mother of Democracy’ on 26th November 2022 at 11:00 am on Google Meet platform. The invited speaker for the session was **Prof. Bhawani Singh Shekhawat**, Retired Professor and Head, Department of Political Science, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur. The event was organized under the guidance of **Dr. Prerna Jain**, Associate Dean Cultural, **Dr. Pooja Nigam**, Coordinator MoE Flagship Programmes, and **Dr. Dipti Sharma**, HOD, DHSS and was coordinated by **Dr. Nidhi Bansal & Dr. Geetanjali Chattopadhyay**, Faculty Advisors, Electoral literacy club alongwith **Prof. Vibhuti Singh Shekhawat**, DHSS.

Dr. Nidhi Bansal began the session by sharing some insights on the Indian Constitution and Equality. Then she introduced the speaker Prof. Bhawani Singh Shekhawat and invited him to address the audience on the Indian constitution and Democracy. Prof. Shekhawat offered tributes to a galaxy of freedom fighters, including Mahatma Gandhi, Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose, Babasaheb Ambedkar, Jawaharlal Nehru, and many others. The speaker started his discussion by explaining the core concepts of Indian Democracy and the Constitution in lucid language to engage the audience. He delved upon the foundational premise of his topic by elaborating on the history of the British Empire and their entry into India and briefed on the origination of the East India Company. The presenter then explained the relevance of the freedom struggle and why it should be studied in academics. Additionally, the speaker enlightened the audience about the challenges the founding fathers faced in reaching a consensus while drafting the Constitution. The session concluded with a discussion on the questions of constitutional morality, the constitution taught at all levels, and things that can be done for our democracy as a student. The comprehensive presentation by the speaker prompted many queries which led to an active discussion and debate among the students, scholars and faculty members.

Dr. Geetanjali Chattopadhyay presented the formal vote of thanks to the speaker for engaging the audience in such insightful manner and felicitated the speaker with an e-memento. She also thanked the Students Welfare Office, the Department of Humanities and social sciences, for the administrative support provided. She also appreciated the assistance of Ms. Heena Choudhary, Research Scholar and the student team of Electoral Literacy Club in smooth conduction of the event.
